Harlan Ellison As Authoritarian

It is not enough to talk the right line; in this life we must walk it straight as well. Otherwise we are contradictory big-mouths.

That lead paragraph paraphrasing Harlan Ellison's recent challenge to Fandom is as far as I intend to follow in his mode. For you see, I have a serious point or two to make. I understand what I'm saying, I've thought it through carefully, and I want you, the reader, to understand me fully. If you understand me to imply that Ellison has done the opposite, has written an incoherent, badly understood. frivolous, and self-contradictory rant in Locus 207 (December 1977), well, so be it, though it's not quite that bad. As you might expect, it is written well and tugs at your heartstrings: pure Ellisonia. But I'll deal later with the tens of side-issues, red herrings and free associations that Harlan Ellison shotguns in his "A Statement of Ethical Position by the Worldcon Guest of Honor" titled by Locus "Re: The 1978 World Science Fiction Convention Iguanacon." Let's first get to the real issue.

Primary Issue

There are certainly enough positions taken in this statement to make one wonder if Ellison is really doing anything. After all, ERA and hurting innocents aside, he is keeping his commitment to attend Iguanacon over the Labor Day Weekend as its Pro Guest of Honor (GoH). So is it all just wind? No, he wants something concrete. He wants us (fandom) to do something, something for him, on his authority. On his authority? Yes, for if we have not decided to do it ourselves, judging the facts and making our own decisions, but now are to override our previous decision because Harlan Ellison asks it of us, then we are bowing to his authority.

Whether or not we should submit to Ellison's authority, I'll leave to the other section. This section is rigidly restricted to discerning the primary issue, sans red herrings.

What, specifically, does Ellison ask us to do, then? "As for those who share my belief that the ERA is a vitally important issue and must not be allowed to be killed by intransigence or by reactionary religious elements in the Arizona state legislature, I suggest fans coming to the convention figure out ways to withhold money from the state as much as possible."

Fair enough it seems. Libertarians expect their fellow frefen to not give money to the State under any circumstances, though we certainly would not waste our breath on statist fen who like to pay taxes. But that kind of thing is not what Ellison means.

Number 1

"Set up feeding arrangements with local fans. Don't shop in the stores. Spend your money with the out-of-state dealers in the huckster rooms, but stay away from the tourist facilities."

Who is supposed to be punished by this action? Ellison says it's the state of Arizona. But he lists nowhere in his tactics anything that could discomfit a politician. He wishes to withhold business from native Arizonans, regardless of their stand on the ERA or complicity with the state legislature. The people to be hurt are Arizona businessmen, Arizona hucksters, Arizona workers who may lose their jobs from the lack of tourist business—and all the fans at Worldcon who forego their needs and pleasures to satisfy Ellison's strategy.

As you can see, the question is not "how good is the cause" or "is the issue worth it?", the question is what in the world is Ellison doing?

Of course, the "boycott" strategy is not Ellison's orginal idea; he adopted it from the National Organization for Women. The fact that their strategy is aimed at harming innocent tradesmen and their dependents who will then (hopefully?) take out their frustration by voting out politicians who don't reflect the views of all these out-of-state busybodies.

The flaws must be obvious, but I'll mention a couple ayways: one, suppose the pro-ERA candidates are also in mour of lots of bad things, too? Such as shutting down the pace Program (not really that bad), or herding science fiction writers into concentration camps or... Second, suppose the person being boycotted can't vote—alien, underage, moved into state late, etc.; or won't vote as a conscientious objector—pacifist, libertarian, Amish, etc.; or voted for the ERA candidate but he or she lost anyways?

NOW's position is to pass something called the Equal Rights Amendment at any cost. Ellison says that he doesn't want to harm innocents. It is clear that following NOW's strategy to obtain "equal rights" via Constitutional Amendment through a blanket boycott harms innocent people. Ellison wants to follow NOW's strategy. Contradiction.

How can you be expected to rally around a contradiction, dear fellow fan? There is no question of the merits of Harlan Ellison's position. A contradiction has no merits.

That is the primary issue. Or it should be. But maybe Ellison doesn't mean what he says.

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To resolve the contradiction, he must either change his strategy to not harm innocents, or follow the strategy for its own sake and damn the innocents. OK, if Ellison changes his strategy, that's a whole different game. I might even be on his side.

But if he doesn't change, then realize that you are being exhorted by Ellison to hurt innocents—including yourself. You're being told to "walk the walk"—but actually it's more akin to bombing civilians to force a government to surrender. We're not talking civil rights marches; we're talking Dresden, Hiroshima, and Viet Nam.

I'm certainly no Worldcon Guest of Honour so I'm not going to tell you what to do. My authority is that of Reason, not a title. Do what *your* reason and conscience tell you. Walk your walk, not Ellison's drunken stagger.

Secondary Issues

Many fans have told me they were annoyed by Ellison's turning the Guest-of-Honor position into a podium for special pleading. That's not the primary issue (see above). For all I know, fans may indeed want a political spokesman, a leader, an authority figure. And Ellison is certainly correct that that was what Heinlein was at MidAmeriCon, with his blood drive.

But make no mistake about it; that is exactly what's going on. If you accept the Con Committee's allowing Ellison to evangelize and mobilize fandom behind this issue (or any other he picks), then fandom will become a political pressure group like unions, corporations, and ethnics. Is a GoH chosen each year to tell us what burning issue fandom should support, or is he or she chosen solely by celebration, as a guest of honour?

Ellison is not arguing authoritatively; he not only does not know what he is talking about, but is willing to admit he's no expert. In fact, he's deferring to NOW "feminists" judgement—their authority.

Now there is a word for someone who asserts authority over your decision-making when he is not "authoritative"—it is authoritarian. (Note the title of this article.)

Now for some of the side issues I promised you. ERA is supported by the "liberal" (read "conservative" in classical terms of "pro-Establishment") feminists. Radical feminists, however, such as libertarians, Marxists, and separatists oppose it in large number, seeing it as a co-opt to a system they don't support. Ellison damning you as unfeminist if you are not for the ERA is a red herring; you could be *more* feminist than Ellison and oppose ERA.

(For those who won't rest until they find out where this author stands on ERA, I don't support any laws or any government acts. I won't lift a finger to either pass or defeat the amendment. Since I'm a revolutionary, I stand to profit from the result of legislation which will disillusion reformers trying to save a system and will drive them into my camp. Since I think ERA is a co-opt and socially conservative, and it will fail miserably to accomplish the ends of its idealistic supporters, thus driving them closer to me, I support the Equal Rights Amendment to the extent of wanting to see it pass. My guess is that the Establishment is making a mistake in the long-run. End of Disclosure.)

Other issues Ellison drags in are references to a religious conspiracy to stop ratification (shades of the Jewish Conspiracy and the Popish plots!), not filling out his contract to Iguanacon, getting sage advice from a bunch of female pros and fans (only Big Names mentioned, none of their qualifications for judging ethics mentioned, though), getting a chance to make a statement (we don't have a chance anytime we want to do so now?) and ...but enough.

If Ellison is "between a rock and a hard place" because he feels morally obligated to both attend Iguanacon under contract and to boycott the area in which it appears, then the Iguanacon can do both Harlan and us a favour—let him out of his contract.

Ghod only knows why someone who's "left Science Fiction" so many times (and never said he's returned) should be a GoH in the first place. Moreover, nobody voted for him. The Bidding Committee selected him after they won the bid (or at least announced it then) and they can change now.

How about it, Iguanacon? Let us all off the hook. —SEK3
