It counts up the units of the letters and the minimum space between words (variable space, unlike the fixed spaces used. say, at the beginning of paragraphs-1 em). When you reach the "justifying range," you are informed by blinking lights and bleeps, in case you want to correct the line, break it yourself, or throw in a discretionary hyphen. If you just keep going, it wil attempt to cut the line off at the space before the word that

went "over the edge" or at a discretionary hyphen. (The more expensive ones have syllabification programmes for hyphenation.) If it cannot (because of maximum space limitation set by switch) it stops and forces the operator to break the line. Otherwise, it starts on the next line, setting that line. It fills in the spaces between words equally (some models will also put small amounts of space between letters if allowed to) to fill out the line. This is in justification mode. One can also switch the typesetter to a "ragged right" mode which will push everything to the left, so it will look arty. Typewriters naturally are ragged right. You can also get ragged left and even ragged center programmes! In justification mode, to get the last line to crowd to the left, you hit a quad left key (there are also quad right and quad center keys). And there's all sorts of other things. but in short answer to your question, the computer justifies the lines.
